FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

Resonating in my thoughts recently is the famous saying of Rabbi Hillel. "If I am not for myself, who will be for me? If I am only for myself, what am I? And if not now, when?" Given the state of the world in which we exist today, so much healing of all kinds is needed. I have been thinking about courage, and the lack thereof. What courage it takes to stand up, step up and speak out when we see injustice, then and now! A verse in Ella's Song, composed by Dr. Bernice Johnson Reagon, one of the founders of Sweet Honey in the Rock, the vibrant, ever-relevant African- American musical ensemble, keeps repeating in my brain: "We who believe in freedom cannot rest until it comes." (https://youtu.be/S2T216XgiOO). This call to ethical action, composed to honor Ella Baker, an African-American civil rights and human rights activist, is similar to Rabbi Hillel's profound declaration. Both can be applied to circumstances in historical times as well as our own.

Contemplating Purim and Passover, upcoming Jewish holidays in March and April, I cannot but be moved by the courage of a Queen Esther who, unsummoned by King Ahasuerus, appears before him. She speaks for the salvation of her fellow Jews in Shushan, despite knowing that she might

incur the wrath of the King, with unknown personal dire consequences. To those of us who celebrate the story of Purim, remember Queen Vashti? And in Queen Esther's case, there is significant danger in revealing to the King that she is a Jew.

Courage is found also in the story of Passover. Moses, a reluctant leader, at first balked at being divinely chosen to confront the Egyptian Pharaoh, yet ultimately found the courage to bring the Israelites out of Egypt, out of bondage towards freedom. We may not have to take the lead like Queen Esther and Moses, but we can and must find the courage to join in the pursuit of justice. We are commanded *tzedek*, *tzedek*, *tirdof*. Justice, justice, shall you pursue. One verse of Ella's Song says, "I need to be one in the number as we stand against tyranny."

National Council of Jewish Women members persist in seeking social justice together: supporting early childhood education and foster youth; advocating for those experiencing homelessness; advocating for refugees, immigrants, and human trafficking victims; protecting reproductive rights and justice; and providing voter education and registration.

Speaking of the right to vote, help us and the Suffrage 100 volunteers celebrate the centennial year anniversary of the 19th Amendment giving women the right to vote (see the article on the presentation of the Suffrage Salon on March 15). NCJW is deeply aware that some still experience disenfranchisement and face obstacles in exercising the right to vote. But do join us on March 15 at 7:00 pm as we celebrate this watershed moment in 1920 for American women. And most importantly, exercise YOUR right to vote on March 3 and next November.

Freedom is certainly not attained in a day, or in forty years in the desert, a reality that circles back in my head to the refrain "We who believe in freedom cannot rest..." I find synergy between NCJW's mission and the following creed by Sweet Honey in the Rock (https://youtu.be/S2T216XgiOO):

In prayer we trust
By hope we live
On truth we stand
From our hearts we give
LOVE.

BE IT RESOLVED! VOTES FOR WOMEN!

You are invited to attend a rollicking evening of historical protest songs and impassioned pleas and readings for women's right to vote! Come hear Susan B. Anthony, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Sojourner Truth, Alice Paul, Harry Burn and many more celebrate the 100th anniversary of the 19th Amendment to the US Constitution. Long Beach NCJW is participating in the city-wide year-long commemoration of the passage of voting rights for women. Come to the **SUFFRAGE SALON**, **Sunday**, **March 15**, **2020 7-9 p.m.** at the AJCC. The first 100 people registering at the event will receive a Susan B. Anthony \$1 coin! This event is open to the public and everyone is encouraged to attend. A donation of \$10-20 is recommended, but not required.

The program will begin *promptly at 7:00 PM* with a brief meeting in the multipurpose room *for members of NCJW Long Beach Section* to vote on the slate of officers for 2020/21. Registration and refreshments will be available. The performance will take place in the Lipeles Auditorium from 7:30p.m. to 9:00p.m.

Lisa Raufman, Co-VP Programs, is the NCJW liason with the Centennial Circle of Women, the planning committee for the series of events in Long Beach to commemorate the passage of women's right to vote. The group, which includes teachers, researchers, performers and artists, is creating extraordinary activities to educate everyone on the struggles for the right to vote, especially the role of Long Beach.

This year of remembrance will conclude on **National Women's Equality Day, August 26, 2020** with a finale celebration at the Long Beach Historical Society. Then one hundred Long Beach women will be recognized for their pioneering roles in the advancement of Long Beach. We recognize that the signing of the 19th Amendment did not make the vote available to all women. Today voting still remains out of reach to many. In the midst of voter suppression we are not just celebrating the vote but also drawing attention to the importance of guaranteed access. With support from the City, the Centennial Circle of Women seeks to increase civic engagement and raise awareness about the history of Women's Right to Vote. Two other Centennial Celebrations during March include:

NCJW Long Beach Section now has its five official voting delegates who will be representing us and attending this year's educational and exciting event! Convention 2020: Jewish Feminisms: Honoring the Past, Shaping the Future, in Chicago, IL. at the Westin Chicago River North—Marriott from April 23-25, is open for registration. Your NCJW Long Beach Section delegates are Sharon Brannon, Linda C. Fox, Cynthia Gordon, Barbara Shipnuck, and Sherri Sobel.

There are always very inspiring speakers. So far we know that one of them will be Tina Tchen, the CEO of Time's Up. Ms. Tchen is a former assistant to President Obama, executive director of the White House Council on Women and Girls, and chief of staff to First Lady Michelle Obama. Tina has worked for decades to advance gender equality, particularly for working women. At the White House, Tina spearheaded the first-ever White House Summit on Working Families and helped form the White House Task Force to Protect Students from Sexual Assault. Prior to taking the helm at TIME'S UP, Tina was a lawyer specializing in workplace culture, advising companies on gender inequity, sexual harassment, and diversity. She has served on numerous strategic advisory boards for organizations, businesses, and nonprofits, including the United State of Women, which she continues to co-chair.

There will be over 20 workshops where we will learn new ideas, explore issues, and discuss strategies. There will be sessions devoted to shaping NCJW's path forward as we vote to revise our national bylaws and resolutions for 2020-2023, and we will hear from our new CEO, Sheila Katz. There will be a pre-convention presidents' training by invitation only on April 22 as well.

If you are interested in attending, check out www.ncjw.org and click on the top bar that says convention. Registration is open until April 5, but the discounted hotel rate ends March 30. Registration is \$600 for the full conference (April 23-25), and \$450 for the Shabbat experience only(April 24-25). Hotel and airfare are at additional cost. 
74TH ANNUAL CHARTER DAY

JUDGES AND VOTERS TURN OUT TO TALK

Our January 29 Pastry and Politics brought together a diverse panel of Superior Court Judges and an audience of about 80. Cantor Hass from event co-sponsor and host Temple Israel of Long Beach opened with a few words of Jewish learning reminding us of the important role of judges going back to the time of Moses as our people moved from slavery in Egypt to self-governance as recounted in our Jewish Bible.

Our judges described their election or appointment to the bench and helped us understand how it all works.

Some key points: HOW IT WORKSCalifornia trial courts are called Superior Court and organized by County (no more Municipal Court.) Los Angeles County is the largest with over 500 judges.

Within their County, judges may be assigned to any courthouse and any area of the law. There is mandatory training held for all California new judges and for judges beginning a specialized assignment.

California judges serve an unlimited number of 6 year terms. When a judicial office is vacated mid-term or when newly created it is filled by the Governor.

When a judicial office is vacated at the end of a term, it is called an "open seat" and filled by election. Only lawyers with 10 years' experience may run for judicial office. Even if there is only one candidate, each open seat appears on our ballot.

If a judge files for re-election, others may file to run against them. If no one files to run against them, they do not appear on our ballot.

DECISIONS, DECISIONS

Even our judges do not have an easy time deciding who to vote for.

They do rely on:

- * Recommendations from persons who personally know or have worked with the candidate.
- * Ratings by the local bar association.
- * Newspaper articles and editorials.

They do read information provided by the candidate, but they keep in mind it is information provided by the candidate. This may include information in the ballot book, candidate websites, and direct mail. It may also include websites such as Voter's Edge which publishes candidates' answers to questions posed by the League of Women Voters.

They do read the fine print to understand who paid for the mail that arrives in their mail box.

And then, like the rest of us they have to decide. Because it really matters.
